RESOLUTIONS adopted by the Bar Association of Washington County, Minnesota, at a meeting held October 25th, A.D. 1894.

WHEREAS the sudden, tragic and unexplained death of Charles M. McCluer has removed from the membership of this bar one who, though not in the active practice or his profession, has been for years an energetic and honored participant in the business affairs of our community, and has ever sustained relations or unvaried cordiality with us all, socially, professionally and in business life;

And WHEREAS the sad event awakens again the grief that so few years since fell upon us through the equally sudden death of his honored father, the late Judge William M. McCluer; *

BE IT RESOLVED, that as a token and expression of our appreciation of the kindly nature and friendly graces of him who has so suddenly withdrawn himself from among us, and for whom naught but the warmest personal friendship has ever been entertained by us, and in respect to the memory of his beloved and lamented father, we hereby extend to the most estimable mother of the departed, bereft as she has been, by sudden calamities, of husband and son, our sincerest and deepest sympathy in this the second crushing crisis of her life.

And BE IT RESOLVED, that a copy of these resolutions be presented to the sorrowing but brave mother of our vanished friend, that they be published in the local press, and, with an appropriate biographical sketch, presented to the District Court of this county for engrossment upon its records.

* MLHP: Judge William Monroe McCluer was born in Franklinville, New York, on September 6, 1821, and died on August 3, 1890. He settled in Stillwater in 1855, and served as judge of the First Judicial District from 1881 to his death.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Charles Monroe McCluer was born August Fifth, 1859, in Stillwater, Minnesota.

He attended school in this City until he was Sixteen years of age when he entered the Adams Academy, of Quincy, Mass., where he was nearly three years the pupil of Dr. Dimmock.

After his return to Stillwater he entered the Law Office of his father, the late Honorable William M. McCluer, afterwards one of the Judges of this Court, and there read law, and was admitted to this bar on the 7th day of June, 1882.

He never practiced law, but was until the time of his death in the Loan Brokerage business, but shortly before his death was contemplating entering upon the active practice of his profession.

His death occurred October 24th, 1894, at his home in this City.
