MARTIN W. GOLDSWORTHY

Martin W. Goldsworthy was born at Hancock, Michigan on August 6, 1889. He attended the public schools at Hancock and, following his graduation from high school, attended the University of Michigan for one year, after which he attended the University of Kansas and was granted his law degree from that school in June, 1914. He was a member of Beta Theta Pi Fraternity.

He was admitted to practice in the State of Michigan in August, 1914, and practiced law in Hancock and Calumet, Michigan until 1921. He was admitted to practice in the State of Minnesota June 17, 1922. From 1921 to 1926 he was Co-ordinator for the United States Veterans Bureau at the University of Minnesota. He was attorney in the Washington, D. C. office of the General Counsel of the Bureau of Internal Revenue from 1927 until 1929 and represented the General Counsel of that Bureau in St. Paul from 1929 until June, 1933. He then engaged in the private practice of law in Minneapolis until 1952. In April of that year he was appointed Attorney and Public Relations Supervisor for the Missouri Basin Survey Commission and remained in that position until the work of this committee was completed.

Mr. Goldsworthy died on March 28, 1956, and leaves surviving him his widow, Marie Goldsworthy, and two daughters, Alice Bromlee and Marjorie Martin, both of Minneapolis.

He served in the United States Navy in 1916, and in later years was a very active member of the Disabled American Veterans, serving as State Commander and also Commander of Chapter No. 1 at Minneapolis.

Martin W. Goldsworthy was a capable and efficient lawyer who treasured the ideals and ethics of the profession. He earned and enjoyed the respect and admiration of his colleagues. His sincerity and devotion to duty won for him the deep and lasting affection of his many friends.
