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





*The dates here given for the beginning of judicial affiliation for Dodge, Freeborn, Mower, Steele, and Waseca, are not the dates upon which they were created. Boundaries as laid down for their parent counties in 1853 were all dependent upon the location of the "upper branch of the Cannon River" and its "lower fork as laid down on Nicollet's map." This location was and still is in dispute. In addition to this, some of the boundaries were on an oblique line to present boundaries. Under these circumstances a discussion of probable original judicial affiliation of the five counties mentioned has not been considered feasible.

The dates here given are the dates when the present counties were created, regardless of whether the same names may have been borne by other counties, now obliterated, in a different area. Where counties now bear a different name than that under which they were created, the date of the original creation is given.

Fifty-seven of the eighty-seven counties in Minnesota were created during the Territorial period before May 11, 1858. Fourteen were created between that date and 1869. Seven, namely Swift, Lac qui Parle, Yellow Medicine, Lincoln, Cook, Kittson, and Marshall Counties were created during the next ten years. Nine, namely Norman, Hubbard, Roseau, Red Lake, Clearwater, Koochiching, Mahnomen, Pennington, and Lake of the Woods have since been added to the list by proclamation.

Several counties which were created, or "established," by the Legislature in the early days, never came into being. Some of the present counties, as for instance Lincoln, Lac qui Parle, and St. Louis, occupy none of the area originally designated by those names. On the other hand there are a few counties which are a continuation of counties which were created under other names, such as Kittson, formerly Pembina; Wilkin, formerly Toombs and Andy Johnson; Clay, formerly Breckenridge. Monongalia was absorbed by Kandiyohi, and Manomin was absorbed by Anoka. Two counties have traded names. After Rock and Pipestone Counties were created, the solons discovered that the quartzite outcrop called "The Rock" was in Pipestone County, and the pipestone quarry was in Rock County, so an adjustment was made accordingly. Wabasha County was once spelled with a final "w" and Dakota with a final "h", while the name of Aitkin County was once "Aiken".

ORGANIC ACT OF MINNESOTA

Sec. 9. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the judicial power of said Territory shall be vested in a supreme court, district courts, probate courts, and in justices of the peace. The supreme court shall consist of a chief justice and two associate justices, any two of whom shall constitute a quorum, and who shall hold a term at the seat of government of said Territory annually; and they shall hold their offices during the period of four years. The said Territory shall be divided into three judicial districts, and a district court shall be held in each of said districts by one of the justices of the supreme court, at such time and places as may be prescribed by law; and the said judges shall, after their appointment, respectively, reside in the districts which shall be assigned them. The jurisdiction of the several courts herein provided for, both appellate and original, and that of probate courts and justices of the peace, shall be as limited by law; provided, that the justices of the peace shall not have jurisdiction of any matter in controversy when the title or boundaries of land may be in dispute, or where the debt or sum claimed shall exceed one hundred dollars; and the said supreme and district courts, respectively, shall possess chancery as well as common law jurisdiction. Each district court, or the judges thereof, shall appoint its clerk, who shall also be the register in chancery, and shall keep his office at the place where the court may be held. Writs of error, bills of exception and appeals shall be allowed in all cases from the final decisions of said district courts to the supreme court, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law, but in no case removed to the supreme court shall trial by jury be allowed in said court. The supreme court or the justices thereof, shall appoint its own clerk, and every clerk shall hold his office at the pleasure of the court for which he shall have been appointed. Writs of error and appeals from the final decisions of said supreme court shall be allowed, and may be taken to the supreme court of the United States, in the same manner and under the same regulations as from the circuit courts of the United States, where the value of the property or the amount in controversy, to be ascertained by the oath or affirmation of either party, or other competent witness, shall exceed one thousand dollars; and each of the said district courts shall have and exercise the same jurisdiction, in all cases arising under the constitution and laws of the United States, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States; and the first six days of every term of said courts, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, shall be appropriated to the trial of causes arising under the said constitution and laws; and writs of error and appeal in all such cases shall be made to the supreme court of said Territory, the same as in other cases. The said clerk shall receive in all such cases the same fees which the clerks of the district courts of the late Wisconsin Territory received for similar services.

Organic Act of Minnesota

Sec. 15. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That all suits, process and proceedings, civil and criminal, at law or in chancery, and all indictments and informations, which shall be pending and undetermined in the courts of the Territory of Wisconsin, within the limits of said Territory of Minnesota, when this act shall take effect, shall be transferred to be heard, tried, prosecuted and determined in the district courts hereby established, which may include the counties or districts where any such proceedings may be pending. All bonds, recognizances, and obligations of every kind whatsoever, valid under the existing laws, within the limits of said Territory, shall be valid under this act; and all crimes and misdemeanors against the laws, in force within said limits, may be prosecuted, tried, and punished in the courts established by this act; and all penalties, forfeitures, actions, and causes of action may be recovered under this act the same as they would have been under the laws in force within the limits composing said Territory at the time this act shall go into operation.

Sec. 17. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the sum of \$5,000 be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended by and under the direction of the said governor of the Territory of Minnesota, in the purchase of a library, to be kept at the seat of government for the use of the governor, legislative assembly, judges of the supreme court, secretary, marshal, and attorneys of said Territory, and such other persons and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law.

Sec. 19. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That temporarily, and until otherwise provided by law, the governor of said Territory may define the judicial districts of said Territory, and assign the judges who may be appointed for said Territory to the several districts, and also appoint the times and places for holding courts in the several counties or subdivisions in each of said judicial districts, by proclamation to be issued by him; but the legislative assembly, at their first or any subsequent session, may organize, alter or modify such judicial districts, and assign the judges, and alter the times and places of holding the courts, as to them shall seem proper and convenient.

Note. The Organic Act of Minnesota is embodied in 9 U.S. Stat. 403-409.

CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA

ARTICLE VI

Judiciary

Judicial Powers. Section 1. The judicial power of the State shall be vested in the supreme court, district courts, courts of probate, justices of the peace, and such other courts, inferior to the supreme court, as the legislature may from time to time establish by a two-thirds vote.

<u>Election</u> and term of office for judges. Sec. 3. The judges of the supreme court shall be elected by the electors of the State at large, and their term of office shall be six years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

District judges may act where supreme judges are disqualified. Whenever all or a majority of the judges of the supreme court shall, from any cause be disqualified from sitting in any case in said court, the governor, or, if he shall be interested in the result of such case, then the lieutenant governor, shall assign judges of the district court of the State, who shall sit in such case in place of such disqualified judges, with all the powers and duties of judges of the supreme court.

Judicial districts for district courts-election of judges-term of office and residence. Sec. 4. The State shall be divided by the legislature into judicial districts, which shall be composed of contiguous territory, be bounded by county lines, and contain a population as nearly equal as may be practicable. In each judicial district, one or more judges, as the legislature may prescribe, shall be elected by the electors thereof, whose term of office shall be six years, and each of said judges shall severally have and exercise the powers of the court, under such limitations as may be prescribed by law. Every district judge shall, at the time of his election, be a resident of the district for which he shall be elected, and shall reside therein during his continuance In case any court of common pleas heretofore estabin office. lished shall be abolished, the judge of said court may be constituted by the legislature one of the judges of the district court of the district wherein such court has been so established for a period not exceeding the unexpired term for which he was elected.

Jurisdiction of district courts. Sec. 5. The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil cases, both in law and equity, where the amount in controversy exceeds one hundred dollars, and in all criminal cases where the punishment shall exceed three months' imprisonment or a fine of more than one hundred dollars, and shall have such appellate jurisdiction as may be prescribed by law. The legislature may provide by law that the judge of one district may discharge the duties of judge of any other district not his own, when convenience or the public interest may require it.

Qualifications. Sec. 6. The judges of the supreme and district courts shall be men learned in the law, and shall receive such compensation at stated times as may be prescribed by the legislature; which compensation shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward for their services.

Judges for other courts to be elected. Sec. 9. All judges other than those provided for in this Constitution shall be elected by the electors of the judicial district, county, or city, for which they shall be created, not for a longer term than seven years.

Vacancies-appointment by governor. Sec. 10. In case the office of any judge become vacant before the expiration of the regular term for which he was elected, the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor, until a successor is elected and qualified. And such successor shall be elected at the first annual election that occurs more than thirty days after the vacancy shall have happened.

Prohibition, supreme or district judges to hold other offices or to be voted for office while in office. Sec. 11. The justices of the supreme court and the district courts shall hold no office under the United States, nor any other office under this State. And all votes for either of them for any elective office under this Constitution, except a judicial office given by the legislature or the people, during their continuance in office, shall be void.

<u>Change of judicial districts</u>. Sec. 12. The legislature may at any time change the number of judicial districts or their boundaries, when it shall be deemed expedient; but no such change shall vacate the office of any judge.

<u>Clerk of court</u>. Sec. 13. There shall be elected in each county where a district court shall be held, one clerk of said court, whose qualifications, duties and compensation shall be prescribed by law, and whose term of office shall be four years.

Legal pleadings. Sec. 14. Legal pleadings and proceedings in the courts of this State shall be under the direction of the legislature. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Minnesota," and all indictments shall conclude, "against the peace and dignity of the State of Minnesota."

LEGISLATION

JURISDICTION--The district courts shall have original jurisdiction in all civil actions within their respective districts, in all cases of crime committed or triable therein, in all special proceedings not exclusively cognizable by some other court or tribunal, and in all other cases wherein such jurisdiction is especially conferred upon them by law. They shall also have appellate jurisdiction in every case in which an appeal thereto is allowed by law from any other court, officer, or body. (Laws, 1849, ch. 20, sec. 10; Revised Statutes, 1851, ch. 69, art. 2, sec. 3; Revised Laws, 1905, sec. 90; Mason's, 1927, sec. 154; 1940 supplement, sec. 154, notes.)

ABSENCE OF JUDGE--WHO MAY ACT--EXCEPTIONS--Whenever the judge who should hear any action, motion, or proceeding is unable to be present, any other judge of the same judicial district may act in his place, except in the trial of causes already begun before the judge so absent: Provided, that motions for a new trial shall be heard by the judge before whom the cause was tried, if he be still in office and not disabled. (General Laws, 1889, ch. 153, sec. 1; <u>Revised Laws</u>, 1905, sec. 98; <u>Mason's</u>, 1927, sec. 177.)

POWER TO ISSUE WRITS--Such district courts shall have power to issue writs of injunction, ne exeat, certiorari, habeas corpus, mandamus, quo warranto, and all other writs, processes, and orders necessary to the complete exercise of the jurisdiction vested in them by law, including writs for the abatement of a nuisance. Any judge thereof may order the issuance of such writs, and direct as to their service and return. (<u>Revised Statutes</u>, <u>1851</u>, ch. 83, secs. 3, 4, 18, 24; <u>General Laws</u>, <u>1881</u>, extra session, ch. 8; <u>General Statutes</u>, <u>1894</u>, secs. <u>4837</u>, <u>5985</u>; <u>Laws</u>, <u>1895</u>, ch. 25, sec. 1; <u>1897</u>, ch. 7, sec. 1; <u>Revised Laws</u>, <u>1905</u>, sec. 92; <u>Mason's</u>, 1927, sec. 156.)

JUDGES MAY ACT IN OTHER DISTRICTS -- Whenever in the judgment of the governor, or of any judge of any judicial district, the convenience or interest of the public or the interest of any litigant shall require that the judge of another judicial district shall discharge any of the duties of such judge, the governor may designate, or such judge may request, a judge of the district court of any other judicial district to discharge any such duties; to hold, or to assist in holding a general or special term of such court, in any county of such judicial district other than his own, or to try and determine any motion, action or proceeding pending therein. And thereupon such judge of the district court, or any other judicial district so designated or requested, may discharge any such duties, hold or assist in holding a general or special term of such court, or try and determine any motion, action, or proceeding pending therein. And by consent of the parties any judge of said court may act in all matters brought before him from another judicial district. In either case the acts, orders and judgments of the judge so acting shall have the same force and effect as though given by a judge of such judicial district. When no other provision has been made therefor, the clerk shall seasonably notify the governor of the inability of the judge to hold any of his terms. ADJOURNED AND SPECIAL TERMS -- The judges of each district may adjourn court from time to time during any term thereof, and may appoint special terms for the trial of issues of law and fact, and, when necessary, direct grand or petit juries to be drawn therefor. Three weeks' published notice of every such special term shall be given in the county wherein it is to be held. They may also appoint special terms for the hearing of all matters except issues of fact, the order for which shall be filed with the clerk, and a copy posted in his office for three weeks prior to such term. (Laws, 1849, ch. 20, sec. 32; <u>Revised Statutes</u>, <u>1851</u>, ch. 69, art. 2, sec. 30; <u>Revised Laws</u>, <u>1905</u>, sec. 99; <u>Mason's</u>, 1927, sec. 178; 1940 supplement, sec. <u>178 notes</u>.)

REVISION OF RULES OF PRACTICE AND OTHER JUDICIARY BUSINESS AUTHORIZED -- The judges of the district courts shall assemble annually at such time and place as may be designated in a call for such meeting given by the district judge of said state longest in continuous service to revise the general rules of practice in such courts, for which purpose any eighteen of them shall constitute a quorum. When so assembled, such judges may revise and amend such rules as they deem expedient, conformably to law, and the same shall take effect from and after the publication thereof. Such rules, as the same shall be so revised and amended from time to time, shall govern all the district courts of the state; but, in furtherance of justice, they may be relaxed or modified in any case, or a party relieved from the effect thereof, on such terms as may be just. Any other proper business pertaining to the judiciary may also be transacted. SEVERAL JUDGES--DIVISION OF BUSINESS--In districts having more than one judge, the one longest in continuous service, or, if two or more be equal in such service, the one senior in age, shall be the presiding judge thereof. The business of the court may be divided between the judges, and otherwise regulated as they by rule or order shall direct. Each may try court or jury causes separately during the same term and at the same time, or two or more of them may sit together in the trial of any cause or matter before the court. If there be a division of opinion, that

of the majority shall prevail. If the division be equal, that of the presiding judge, or, if he be not sitting, that of the judge senior in age, shall prevail. In districts composed of not less than ten counties, the senior judge, at least 30 days before the time appointed by law for the holding of a general term of the court in each county, by order filed in the office of the clerk of the court in that county, shall designate and assign one or more of the judges of such district to preside at the term so appointed, and the clerk forthwith shall mail a copy of such order to each judge of the district. If any judge assigned to hold a term of court as herein provided is incapacitated by illness or otherwise to preside at such term, another judge shall be designated and assigned in like manner to take his place. The same judge shall not be designated or assigned to hold two consecutive general terms in the same county. TERMS TO BE PUBLISHED--The secretary of state shall publish in a volume of laws enacted at each legislative session, a schedule of the times of holding court in the several counties as fixed by law. (<u>General Laws</u>, 1883, ch. 7; <u>Revised Laws</u>, <u>1905</u>, sec. 97; <u>Laws</u>, 1909, ch. 244, sec. 2; <u>Mason's</u>, 1927, sec. <u>176</u>.

ELECTION OF CLERK--BOND--DUTIES--There shall be elected in each county a clerk of the district court who before entering upon the duties of his office, shall give bond to the county, to be approved by the County Board, in a penal sum not less than One Thousand Dollars nor more than Ten Thousand Dollars, conditioned for the faithful discharge of his official duties: Provided that in counties having a population of more than 200,000 and less than 350,000 inhabitants the amount of such bond shall be Ten Thousand Dollars, and in counties having a population of more than 350,000 the amount of such bond shall be \$25,000.00, which bond, with his oath of office, shall be filed for record with the Register of Deeds. Such clerk shall perform all duties assigned him by law and by the rules of the court. He shall not practice as an attorney in the court of which he is the clerk.
