

Mr. Miner was born in 1850 at Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, and, after getting his primary education there and, attending one year at Hillsdale College in Michigan, moved with his family to a farm near Pineland, Minnesota. He was graduated from the University of Minnesota as a member of the third class and, probably, its oldest alumnus and the recipient of the first Phi Beta Kappa key.

He was graduated from the Albany Law School and commenced and continued the practice of law in Minneapolis until his retirement shortly before his demise. With marked ability he served in the City Council for a term. He was a capable lawyer and both in his profession and as a public official was regarded as a man of great integrity and held the high esteem of his associates and the community. He was a charter member of the Hennepin County bar, a member of the Masonic lodge and an attendant of West Minister Church. He left surviving, of his immediate family, his wife, Maria U. Miner, residing at 3022 Dupont Avenue South, Minneapolis, Elliott E. Miner, Instructor of the State School for Boys, Jamesburg, New Jersey, Robert L. Miner, Engineer, of Waterloo, Iowa, Mrs. Earl J. Neutson of Minneapolis and Mrs. Arthur E. Brisley of Cook, Minnesota.
