HARRY SCOTT, ESQ.

Harry Scott was, born in Waterford, Virginia, on May 10, 1886. He began his early education at the school in Reistertown, Maryland, and later moved to Washington, D.C., where he worked to pay his tuition through Howard University, from which he graduated with a B.A. degree in the year 1911.

He began his study of law, enrolling at the University of Buffalo, at Buffalo, New York, from which he graduated with a law degree, June 16, 1916. About the year 1917 he came to Minneapolis, Minnesota, and enrolled at the Minnesota College of Law, from which he graduated and was admitted to the bar of the State of Minnesota, February 18, 1918. He continued the active practice at his profession in Minneapolis, Minnesota, for thirty-eight years, and until the time of his death, having enjoyed a satisfying legal practice.


Mr. Scott was a conscientious defender, diligent studying the law to protect his clients, yet modest enough to accept legal advice from his brother lawyers if he felt it would benefit his cause. He was also a fine orator in presenting his case to the Court or to the Jury.

Mr. Scott was an honest, upright, christian gentleman who respected his fellow men and turn was respected by them.

In the year 1912, he married Marie Louise Lockwood who was a grand daughter of Dr. Charles B. Boynton, founder and first president of Howard University, Washington, D.C. To them were born three children, namely, Harry Scott, Junior, who died at the age at seven and a half years, and two daughters, Mrs. Helen Whiteside and Mrs. Dorothy Roberts.

Harry Scott died January 25, 1957, and was survived by his wife, two daughters and five grand-children. Mrs. Scott died August 30, 1957. His survivors shall always remember him as a loving, devoted husband and father and his friends for his cheerful, kind thoughts and deeds.

Harry Scott's memory will long remain in the hearts of his brother lawyers and his personality and professional conduct upon the profession at law has left an unperishable goal which shall be his monument.
