IN MEMORY OF G. HARVEY SNYDER

Born October 10, 1878 in Mower County, Minnesota, on a farm near Rose Creek. Departed his life in the City of Minneapolis, County of Hennepin and State of Minnesota, December 16, 1939. Surviving are his widow, Edna W. Snyder, Glyde Harvey Snyder, son, and Helen Schiavone, daughter, all of Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Born of farmer parents on a farm in Mower County about half way between the city of Austin and the Village of Rose Creek. His early education was in the country school and village school at Rose Creek; grammar grades and High School at Austin, Minnesota.

His first position of any importance was that of Clerk in the County Treasurer's office at Mower County, Minnesota, from which he entered into employment in a National Bank in said city.

He came to Minneapolis, in the year 1911; was admitted and started the practice of law in the year 1915,* being then associated with one John E. Tappan, as attorneys for the Investors Syndicate. He became one of the Directors thereof, a position he held for several years.

He continued his practice of law until his last illness during which time he was associated with the late David Gorham with offices in the Andrus Building. Thereafter he became associated with Neil Hughes, his brother Marshall Snyder, Douglas X. Juneau and George R. Kodadek with offices in what is now the Midland Bank Building.

He specialized in general practice leaning to the civil rather than the criminal. As to his standing and ability as a lawyer he was second to none, while at the same time being ever willing to go out of his way to assist or advise some young inexperienced and struggling youth. He was always willing to assist indigent clients. In his personal dealings and

habits he was generous to a fault and scrupulously honest; in politics he was a free lance, and took a keen interest in all civic affairs.

As to his wife and children he was ever faithful and was ever a dutiful and loving husband and father.

His last rights and services were conducted at Lakewood cemetery.
